

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



HIGH SCHOOL

Whether college or career bound, Chester County High School students have the opportunity to find their fit and learn in various fields, including technology, arts, science, nursing and education.

For students interested in becoming a teacher, the high school has partnered with Freed-Hardeman University to offer teacher preparatory courses. “We’re introducing them at the high school level, where they learn to write lesson plans and experience what it looks like to be an educator. Hopefully, they’ll work in the district one day,” Chester County Schools Superintendent Troy Kilzer II said. “We want to grow our own high quality teachers.”

If students are interested in technology, computer science teacher Adele Ellington said students learn to code and build websites. “By the time students are in their fourth year, they are updating the school’s website, participating in job shadowing and other work-based learning opportunities,” she said.

Students with a green thumb or a heart for animals can nurture those talents in the sciences. They can gain hands-on learning about agriculture through The Shed, where students plant vegetables and plants, raise chickens and study the impact of agriculture science on a community.

“We have more than 70 students in the agriculture program; we’re hoping to continue to build the program, where students can graduate with a diploma that is agriculture focused,” agriscience teacher Teresa Crouse said.



In Jeff Haltom's visual arts class, students learn the different types of cameras and how to make a pin-hole camera. Student creativity is on full display – with drawings of celebrities, landscapes and famous renderings throughout the classroom.

When students are not in the classroom, they often are serving the community. Using Eagle One, a refurbished school bus, students deliver donations to food insecure families. The CCHS Student Health Council promotes kindness, anti-smoking, anti-bullying and no texting while driving campaigns, in addition to conducting service projects.

“Our school is very much a family,” Principal Clay Murley said. “We have a partnership with all of the schools, so that we can address the needs of our students. We definitely lean on one another.”

Chester County Junior High Principal Belinda Anderson stood in the middle of a bustling hallway, wearing blue framed glasses and a matching blue T-shirt with the slogan “Students Stole My Heart,” as many students stopped for a hug, a good morning greeting or words of encouragement.

It's a typical day for her — one filled with laughter and gentle nudges for her students. In her fifth year as principal, Anderson and her staff are focused on academic achievement while also building positive, supportive relationships with the sixth-through-eighth-grade students.

“This is a very vulnerable and socially challenging time for them,” Anderson said.

In 2021, Chester County Junior High was named a finalist for the Rise Award, a recognition given to schools that use Summit Learning. This research-based education curriculum is designed to drive student engagement, meaningful learning and strong student-teacher relationships.


“With Summit Learning and the total commitment of our staff and students, we're here to build the best student success we can possibly build, and we're trying to do that the best we can,” said Anderson. She added that the goal is for the school to earn reward school status with the Tennessee Department of Education.

There's no shortage of fun and challenging lessons happening at the junior high, including Dr. Leah Shull's eighth grade English language arts class, where students prepare for the rigors of high school writing assignments and participate

in National Novel Writing Month in November.

“Students are challenged to write a novel in 30 days,” Shull said. “Our students focus on writing long papers, and I'm always amazed by their growth. When they get to high school, I want them to impress the pants off their teachers.”

For eighth grader Tessa Moore, Shull's class is her favorite part of her day. "I used to hate English language arts until I got into her class," Moore said.

Chester County Junior High School students have the opportunity to explore talents and skills yet undiscovered. One such student opportunity is the Eagle Vision Network, the school's morning announcement show. It airs daily at 7:55 a.m., with students working as reporters and behind the scenes of the show. Assistant Principal Todd Lewis said the 10-minute show is always a fun start to his day.

"They're doing everything – from running the sound board to working on graphics," he said. "This is really preparing them well before high school, and they like it. We're fortunate to have business sponsors to help us upgrade our equipment."

Student members are Gavin White, Ryan Whitman, Arlean Dixon, Hudson Lewis, Jasce Alexander, Will Whidden, Kynleigh Butler and Rhett Young, who is the third member of his family to participate in the Eagle Vision Network.

"I think this helps us learn how to talk to people," said White, an eighth grader. Others added that the opportunity has helped them solidify future goals.. including Dixon, an eighth-grade member who desires to be a YouTuber.

Chester County Middle School held its first spelling bee in recent years thanks to the persistence of fifth grader Cael Markum, who wrote to Principal TJ Kirk advocating for it.

"Mostly, I really enjoy learning and competition," Markum said. "It took me four or five hours to write the letter, and I included helpful documents and links."

An avid reader who considers Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. one of his heroes, Markum has read the entire Harry Potter series 11 times. Markum nearly made it to the last round of the spelling bee.

"I missed the word 'cambric,' but I won't miss that again," Markum said. "To be the best, you have to work for it. When people think you're going to fall short, show them what you can do."

With the installment of the new Kid Congress, leadership is encouraged early amongst the fourth and fifth


graders. Kid Congress is a student government organization that works to pass 'bills' to help the school community. More than 30 students are involved in Kid Congress. Some of their ideas include adding paper cups by the water fountain, providing nice gifts for teacher appreciation and painting the student restrooms. "We're trying to be helpful, not boss anyone around," said Mari Ryan Howell, a fifth grader.

In recognition of a student who exhibits the word of the month, he or she will be named the "Eagle Ninja of the Month." For the

recognition the student receives a yard sign to display at home.

Kirk said that the faculty's work and dedication are key to the improvement and continuing academic success Chester County Middle School has experienced.

"We're extremely proud that in a small school and small district, our teachers make it happen — reaching and motivating students to work and learn and grow. We've been able to see the fruits of our hard work," he said.

BRINGS HISTORY *to* LIFE



Learning what inspired Amelia Earhart's love for flying or how Walt Disney fulfilled his mission to create "The Happiest Place on Earth" will have a whole new meaning for East Chester Elementary students, following the success of the school's first living museum.

The living museum took over the hallways, cafeteria and outdoor spaces for a few hours, as 31 third-graders portrayed living and deceased historical figures, including Dolly Parton, Jackie Robinson, Benjamin Franklin, Sacagawea and Jane Goodall. The school's younger students, kindergarten through second grade, toured their school, stopping to press a faux button on the wall to activate the historic figure, who then 'awakened' to tell their character's story. Third-grader Hailey Thrift portrayed Jane Goodall, who is known for her advocacy for primates.

"I like her because she loves animals," said Thrift, who wore binoculars made from paper around her neck while holding a stuffed animal. "My favorite animal is a wolf."

From the school's Leader in Me program and Seven Habits of Highly Effective Kids, school leaders are often in search of ways to inspire students. Each grade level talks





about a habit — Be Proactive; Begin with the End in Mind; Put First Things First; Think Win-Win; Seek First to Understand. Then Be Understood; Synergize; and Sharpen the Saw.

“East Chester is a family who loves all of our students and staff and makes everyone feel welcomed and loved,” Nancy Burns, who has taught at the school for 30 years, said. “The faculty and staff help build a love for learning and strive each day to help students grow and be productive citizens in our community.”

Four retired teachers work with students in small group interventions for four hours a day. Norma Morrison is one of the retired teachers who returned to the building after having worked there for 45 years. Morrison specializes in reading intervention.

“I feel like I’m doing some good,” Morrison said. “I love these kids, and I love seeing their ‘light bulb’ moments, because those are real.”

The West Chester Elementary School community prides itself on being a family. "Staff members model empathy, compassion and learning for the students that we are blessed to serve every single day," Principal Amy Wooley said.

The school's welcoming environment begins with her office administration attendance secretary, Sandy Cravens, and secretary/bookkeeper, Janice Guinn, who has served for 34 years. Guinn's connection with West Chester Elementary began when she was a student there in the 1960s. "It was a brand new building," said Guinn, who described

her return to her childhood school to build a long-lasting career as being rewarding. "I've watched students grow up and bring their children to school here. It's like having grandchildren."

Not only are teachers mentors to the students but to everyone on the staff as well.

"We believe that we must model our expectations," Wooley said. "Every staff member takes on the responsibility, and our students respond positively."

On a particular day in Natalie Cravens' third-grade classroom, students reviewed a unique lesson about the Iditarod (dog sled) race, showing their knowledge of the race's history. She shared this lesson with her students because she remembers the impact it had on her when she was a student. Additionally, her students have interviewed a laser scientist and astronomer.

One of her favorite assignments is having the students design Powerpoint presentations about themselves.

"We create a positive environment and remind kids that school is about experiencing different things, which makes a world of difference," Cravens, who has been teaching for six years, said. "All teachers care about their kids. Once they're your kid, they're always your kid, and it's those light bulb moments that really keep me going."

Every member of the West Chester Elementary family plays a vital role in the growth and success of the students. "The leadership team that consists of teachers, teacher coaches and counselors provides a safe place to land for staff and students, while providing academic guidance," Wooley said. "West Chester Elementary could not be who we are without the phenomenal effort put forth every day by this team."

A CLOSE-KNIT LEARNING COMMUNITY

There's no shortage of care, compassion and community pride at Jacks Creek Elementary. With 130 kindergarten through third grade students and a dozen teachers, Jacks Creek may be the district's smallest school, but the drive to ensure the success of all of the students is an immensely collaborative effort.

"We're a close-knit family working together," said Nancy Davidson, a second grade teacher who has taught at Jacks Creek for 31 years. "We know our students really well and are aware of where they are academically."

Davidson spent the first 17 years of her career as a kindergarten teacher before transitioning to teaching second and third graders. She has been close to Jacks Creek Elementary and the community since her days there as a student.

"So much has changed since I was a student, especially with technology and how it's used in instruction," Davidson said.

Each student has a laptop to use i-Ready and Prodigy, two computer programs that help them with reading and math skills.

In Hailey Thomas' third grade class, students use their Google classroom to answer math review questions.

"It gives them four or five questions to answer, and that allows me to assess where they are," Thomas said. "It really keeps them engaged, helps them practice for TCAP (Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program), and they can battle each other."

School support at Jacks Creek involves not only the parents but the local community, as well.

"The Jacks Creek Church of Christ congregation has been so generous to us," Davidson said. "They've sent us notes of prayer and goodie bags."

Support for the school's leadership, students and staff helps the school serve its purpose and passion.

"Our goal is to provide the best environment and education possible to support the development of well-rounded students," Principal Tangie Sweatman said. "It brings such joy to see each and every child learn and grow in so many ways."
